News From across the Borough



In March, Mark White from Billingham was presented with a Commander of the British Empire (CBE) from HRH The Prince of Wales at Windsor Castle.

Mr White was previously appointed Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 2016 for his services to education and is chair of Stockton-on-Tees Strategic Education Board.

The promotion to CBE is in recognition of Mr White's services to further education and was announced in The King's Birthday Honours List 2023.



Newport Bridge improvements

Newport Bridge is temporarily closed for major construction work this summer.

The work, which started on Monday 8 July, is expected to take around seven weeks and includes bridge joint and bearing replacement, new drainage channels, waterproofing and carriageway resurfacing.

During this time, the A1032 from Newport roundabout to Portrack interchange will be closed with access for affected businesses only. Signed traffic diversions will be in place.

A family who had a carbon monoxide alarm fitted as part of a scheme funded by Thornaby Town Deal had their lives saved thanks to the device.

Shugufta Ali had a carbon monoxide alarm fitted along with other security measures at her home in North Thornaby after she received a letter to inform her that she was one of 1,500 properties eligible for the free scheme.

A month later, the alarm alerted her to the gas boiler in her home emitting poisonous carbon monoxide gas which could have been fatal to her family. She credits the scheme for saving her life, as the odourless gas is life threatening and she would not be aware of the leak without the alarm.

The Bread and Butter Thing

There are now five 'The Bread and Butter Thing' low-cost food hubs across the Borough, including new hubs at Newtown and Roseworth.

The scheme offers three bags of food worth around £35 for only £8.50, including fresh fruit and veg, chilled food and cupboard staples like cereal. You can also pay just £5 for an individual bag or £17 for a six bag 'family' deal.

Free boiler servicing available

As part of the Council's 'Warm Homes Healthy People' scheme, we are offering free boiler servicing to eligible residents across the Borough from July to September 2024.

To qualify, you must be the homeowner and have not accessed the scheme within the past two years, be claiming a means tested benefit and be 65 years or over. For residents under 65, you must be in receipt of a disability benefit, have a long term illness made worse by the cold, live with a child under 5 who has a long term illness made worse by the cold or you are living with dementia.

Tailored support around sexual health, relationships and wellbeing for our young people with SEND needs will be delivered by national charity, Brook.

More childcare help for families

From September 2024, eligible working parents will be entitled to 15 hours of childcare per week if they have children from the age of nine months to two-years-old.

Parents can choose which early years provider to use, such as a childminder, day nursery, playgroup, pre-school, or school nursery. Depending on the provider, these hours can be used over 38 weeks of the year (during school term time), or up to 52 weeks if fewer than the total hours are used per week.

From September 2025, this will increase to 30 hours childcare per week for eligible working parents.

Care Leavers Local Offer

If you are a care leaver, or are about to leave care, there's a range of support on offer.

As part of the Council's Corporate Parenting Pledge, we want all care experienced young people to feel safe and supported and know where and who to go to for advice and help.

Stockton-on-Tees has a care leavers' Local Offer which has been created by young people who are currently cared for and those who are care experienced. It brings together in one place at www.stockton.gov.uk/care-leavers-local-offer the support available.

The Council has committed to an Employability Promise to support our care experienced young people into education, training and employment. This includes help with CVs, interview techniques, help applying for apprenticeships and jobs and guaranteeing an interview for Council vacancies providing the Person Specification for a role is met.

Plus, the 'No Limits Hub' is also available for children in care and care leavers to drop in to for support.





Fun, food and friends!

There will be lots of free exciting activities for eligible school-aged children in the Borough during the sixweek summer break.

A wide range of activities will be on offer during our Holidays Are Fun (HAF) summer programme, including outdoor bushcraft, swimming, ice skating, arts and crafts, cinema trips and film-making. Sessions suitable for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are included.

Families in receipt of benefits-related free school meals, claiming universal credit, experiencing financial difficulties, or that have a child with SEND are eligible.

Every child that participates will receive a nutritious meal each day.

Activities will also be running during October half-term. Bookings open on Monday 30 September.

HAF is funded by the Department for Education (DfE) and delivered by the Council in partnership with Catalyst.



The Bowesfield Story

With a state-of-the-art building, modern classrooms and over two acres of grassland, trees and playground, Bowesfield Primary School is an oasis of learning, right in the heart of Stockton. Since opening in 1881, many staff and pupils have passed through the original Bowesfield Lane buildings and the current school on Northcote Street.

Janet McNeilly joined Bowesfield in 1984 and works with the children to learn about the school's history and changes to the local area.

Miss McNeilly said: "Our today is tomorrow's history. It's important to remember all those who came before, and important that we leave our mark on the school."

Recently rated by Ofsted as 'Good' across the board, and with an 'Outstanding' early years provision, the school offers children a caring and compassionate learning environment.

£7.5m for Oxbridge Lane Primary School




Multi-million pound renovation works at Oxbridge Lane Primary School are on the way which will provide a modern and improved teaching environment for the 135 year old primary school.

New facilities at the school are set to include a new entrance and lobby, kitchen, nursery area and entrance and a multi-use games area (MUGA).

Head Teacher, Lauren Amerigo said: "The upgraded facilities will provide a modern and conducive learning environment for our pupils. The works will help the school become more of a central community hub and will bring our nursery provision onto the same site and give Oxbridge Lane a school kitchen which will help provide our own healthy meals for the children."

The refurbishment will be funded by the Council as part of its multi-million pound investment to improve school buildings across the Borough.



Giving young people the skills to build their careers

Do you know a young person with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) who may need help accessing employment?

Supported Internships help young people with SEND to gain valuable workplace experience and a stepping stone into employment.

Structured work-based study programmes support 16 to 24-year-olds who have an education, health and care plan (EHCP) who would not be able to access employment without support.

Interns will develop their job skills and independence whilst attending a full-time college placement in a subject area of their choice. The college each young person attends will create a personalised study programme that meets their needs and provides progression, alongside time with an employer.

New-look Children and Young People's Disability Register

If you're a parent or carer of a child with a disability, you can sign up to a disability register to stay informed about all the services available to you and help shape future services.

The Children and Young People's Disability Register can be found at www.stockton. gov.uk/child-young-person-disability-register. There's a short form to complete to sign up - and the information you provide is linked to your My Council account and can be removed or updated at any time.

To be eligible for the Children and Young People's Disability Register your child must:

- Have a learning difficulty, mental health, medical condition or a physical disability
- Be 0 to 25 years old
- Live in the Borough of Stockton-on-Tees



Our regular "Spotlight On" feature highlights organisations from the Borough's voluntary, community and social enterprise sector. In this issue, we're looking at Teesside Vineyard Church.

Teesside Vineyard Church, Thornaby, is part of the Vineyard Movement group of churches and gathers people from across the Tees Valley.

Kat Dawson, who is the Children's and Community Pastor for the church, said: "Our church is a hub of activity and provides so much support for the community. Whether it's the Vine Café, which is open every Wednesday 10am to 12pm and offers a warm, friendly place for people to meet over a free cuppa and a slice of cake, and advice on a variety of issues.

"Or our Grow Baby service which provides free, high quality, new and second-hand clothing and other essentials for children aged 0 to five years. The Little Seedlings playgroup offers a place for 0 to five-year-olds to play and socialise alongside their parents and carers. We also run a sports club for 10 to 16-year-olds.

"This year we have also expanded our support to be a 'The Bread and Butter Thing' venue to give people access to nutritious and affordable food. This low-cost weekly shop, run by volunteers, provides essential produce, fridge favourites and cupboard staples."

Working together to make Ropner and Stockton Town Centre safer

Work is underway to help reduce crime and improve the lives of residents in the Ropner Ward area, including a new drop-in surgery.

Project Harmony is part of the Home Office's national 'Clear, Hold, Build' approach, which operates in areas affected by organised crime with neighbourhood policing teams taking the lead on tackling it.

In Ropner Ward, as well as Cleveland Police, it is supported by the Council, North East Ambulance Service, Cleveland Fire Brigade, Thirteen Group as well as charities and voluntary and community organisations like Catalyst and Corner House Youth Project. Following a community consultation, a local neighbourhood delivery plan has now been developed and is being delivered to respond to local issues in the area.

Local residents groups are being established in the area and a Ropner Partnership multi-agency drop-in surgery is now being held every month. Come along to ask questions and get advice from a variety of organisations and to discuss any concerns and issues.

The next multi-agency drop in is a family fun afternoon on Wednesday 10 July, 3pm to 6pm at Farooq E Azam Mosque & Islamic Centre, Bowesfield Lane, Stockton, TS18 3EB.

Changing Places at ARC Stockton

A Changing Places toilet is now available at ARC Stockton.

Changing Places toilets provide extra equipment and space to allow people with learning or physical disabilities to use a toilet facility safely and comfortably.

The new toilet has been possible thanks to funding from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities with support from the Council, in association with Muscular Dystrophy UK.

Making it Real Board - Update

In the last edition of Stockton-on-Tees News, we announced the launch of the 'Making it Real Board' which puts people with lived experience of adults and health services at the heart of decision making. Here is the latest update from the Making it Real Board.

We have welcomed some new members and have really embedded the principles of co-production. Following a Development Day in May we are finalising group agreements about how it will work together, so that everyone can contribute and have their voices heard and are valued for their involvement equally.

Work has started on a 'local account' which will inform residents about how Adults Health & Wellbeing services in our area are working, including priorities and future action areas.

Making it Real Board member, Claire Andrews, said: "It's been challenging yet rewarding. We want the opportunity to influence and coproduce, so our services really reflect our needs and lived experiences. We want to provide that 'reality check' of what it is really like on the other side of service provision. But most importantly we want the best care and support for all residents in the Stockton-on-Tees area."

We are really keen to 'make it real' for everyone in the Borough. So, over the next 3 months will be actively seeking out members, voices and experiences from individuals and groups that are not currently represented in discussions.

A Lord-Lieutenant is His Majesty The King's personal representative and there is one in each county. They are appointed by His Majesty and the post is non-political and unpaid.

The Lord-Lieutenant of County Durham Mrs Sue Snowdon, and Lord-Lieutenant of North Yorkshire Mrs Jo Ropner represent The King in Stockton-on-Tees.

Stockton-on Tees is special as it can claim to have two Lord-Lieutenants due to the River Tees running through the centre of the town. The Lord-Lieutenant of County Durham, Mrs Sue Snowdon, to the north of the Tees and the Lord-Lieutenant of North Yorkshire Mrs Jo Ropner to the south of the Tees.

The responsibilities of the Lord-Lieutenant include:

- Arranging visits by members of the Royal Family and escorting visitors
- Presenting medals and awards on behalf of the Sovereign, and advising on Honours nominations

- Participating in civic, voluntary and social activities within the Lieutenancy
- Acting as liaison with local units of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, Army, Royal Air Force and their associated cadet forces
- Leading the local magistracy as chairman of the Advisory Committee on Justices of the Peace

Part of their role is to encourage nominations to the Kings Award for Voluntary Service. The award celebrates the outstanding work of local volunteer groups across the UK. Last year, Lord-Lieutenant Sue Snowden presented local charity Sprouts with a Kings Award for their commitment to the voluntary service.

The award is the equivalent of an MBE, and recognise groups that are truly outstanding and making a big difference to their local community.

Sexual health support

Sexual Health Teesside offers free, confidential sexual health services for all Stockton-on-Tees Borough residents. It's easy to get advice, tests and contraception, with telephone appointments, home tests, online ordering, and face to face appointments available.

The sexual health hub at Lawson Street in Stockton has contraception, including emergency, hormonal, and longacting contraception, such as coils or implants. Plus, there's free testing and treatment available for sexually transmitted infections like chlamydia, gonorrhoea, syphilis and HIV.

Young people can also get free emergency hormonal contraception (the morning after pill) from their GP, or a local pharmacy. Everyone aged 16-24 can order free condoms online or join the free 'C-Card' scheme available at local pharmacies.

Building a healthier future together

Partnership and community working have been highlighted in this year's Director of Public Health Report as ways of tackling the health inequalities experienced by people in the Borough.

The 2023-2024 report describes the actions being taken to address challenges facing the Borough because of the cost-of-living crisis, the ongoing impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, and the financial pressure on local authorities.



Whilst tackling poverty and deprivation remains important, the report acknowledges that action must go beyond this to address the many factors leading to inequality.

Sarah Bowman-Abouna, Director of Public Health, said: "There is a real will and passion to address inequality across our local health and wellbeing system and to work in partnership together with communities, who sit at the heart of all we do.

"We now need to drive forward our collective activities to improve outcomes with, and for, local people."



Let's recycle more!

Here's a reminder of what you can recycle:

Blue Box

- Glass bottles and jars (clear, green and brown)
- Batteries (within their own clear bag)

Paper pocket

- Paper
- Newspapers
- Magazines
- Catalogues
- Telephone directories

White sack

- Plastic bottles
- Yoghurt pots and butter tubs
- Plant pots
- Greetings cards
- Cardboard
- Aluminium/steel tins and cans
- Aluminium foil
- Aerosols (fully extinguished)

Remember to make sure your items are clean before recycling. Garden waste will also be collected on the same day as your recycling.

Soft plastics such as crisp packets, bread bags, cling film and carrier bags can be recycled at libraries across the borough including Stockton Central, Billingham Central, Thornaby Central, Norton and Ingleby Barwick.

A step forward for Billingham town centre

Proposals to purchase part of Billingham Town Centre as part of a continued commitment to invest in the town and bring about transformational change was considered by the Council's Cabinet last month.

The plans would see the purchase of West Precinct, including the former library site and Queensway South buildings and are part of an emerging masterplan for Billingham Town Centre, which include concept designs for the creation of a new residential area, new retail space and improvements to parking, public toilets, accessibility and public realm. This also includes the refurbishment of the former Council office, Wynyard House, which will ensure the authority retains a presence in the town centre.

The purchase and demolition of the town centre would be funded by £20million secured from the Government's Levelling Up Fund for the Stockton North constituency. The plans were drawn up following the 'Let's Talk About Our Towns' public consultation in 2020.

Demolition is expected to begin in early 2025.

Transforming Thornaby



Exciting plans are underway to create a new modern leisure facility in Thornaby.

The Council has reached agreement to take control of the Golden Eagle hotel in Thornaby so that the building can be demolished to make way for the development of the site using funding from the Thornaby Town Deal. This follows the Council taking control of the vacant Phoenix House site in January 2022 and demolishing it last summer.

The site will be regenerated to create a modern, fit-for purpose, five-lane swimming pool and gym next to the Phoenix House site, linking to the Pavilion leisure centre. The new leisure

facility would include gym changing facilities on the first floor, as well as a new entrance, public realm improvements and enhanced parking.

A planning application for the building's demolition will be submitted in autumn, with demolition expected to begin before the end of the year. Construction on the new swimming pool is expected to begin next year, subject to planning approval.

NETA Training has also unveiled plans for the development of its purpose-built centre in Thornaby as part of the Town Deal.

The new campus, delivered in partnership with the Council, will enhance the delivery of quality engineering and construction training in the Borough for young people and adults.

Design is underway on the new building, which will be situated on the Stockton Riverside Collect site, with work expected to start late in the summer following planning approval.



Work continues on Stockton Waterfront urban park construction

The construction of Stockton Waterfront urban park is continuing at pace. New images show the progress of the piling works to accommodate ground conditions, as well as work to the reinforced concrete wall structures on the western side of the new road alignment on Riverside Road.

Paving work is also being undertaken on Finkle Street, which will show the first visual signs of the urban park in place. The work to Finkle Street will complement the new Finkle Square in the urban park, which will be the main arrival point from the centre of the High Street.

Its location will combine the urban park with existing streetscape on Finkle Street and will include a more intimate setting. The square will include, seating, heritage interpretation and further space and services for hosting events.


Stockton Town Hall

Maintenance and repair work to the Stockton Town Hall, roofs, clock tower and windows were completed in May.

During the conservation work, structural timber and masonry repair works have been made to the clock tower, while leadwork to the clock tower roofs and the spire have also been replaced as part of the repair works.

Sections of roof tiles have been replaced, and lightning protection has been installed. The final steps also included the refurbishment of a number of the town hall windows and the reassembly of the iconic clock mechanism.

Norton High Street works progressing



Improvements to Norton High Street are continuing, with the first phase of paving works open to the public and businesses and the second phase of paving underway.

The plans include the creation of a northbound one-way system at the southern section of the High Street, which is now in place. Improvements to extend the pedestrianised areas and additional car or taxi spaces are ongoing.

The second phase of paving work is underway, which includes highway and footpath works between Harland Place and Holly Street towards the Red Lion.

Exciting next steps for transforming Preston Park Museum & Grounds

The construction of the new extension to Preston Park Museum is continuing. The two-storey building's steelwork frame and flooring is in place and work to create over 100 additional parking spaces is also underway.

Meanwhile, plans for improved café and toilets have been approved, as part of efforts to upgrade facilities for visitors to this much-loved destination. This includes refurbishment of the park café, with a new, covered outdoor seating area, facing onto the children's play area. A new building, connected to the café, will house new toilets including accessible 'Changing Places' facilities.

Work is expected to start on the café and toilets improvement later this month.



Ambitious proposals to develop a Care and Health Innovation Zone in Stockton-on-Tees are ready to transform central Stockton and North Thornaby into a nationally significant cluster of social care and health provision.

The vision outlines how Teesdale Business Park and the nearby Tees Marshalling Yards will be home to social care and health services, sector-specific businesses, research, teaching and learning facilities, and housing to meet local needs.

A partnership board with representatives from Teesside University, Tees Esk and Wear Valley NHS Trust, North Tees NHS Trust, the Education Training Collective (Stockton Riverside College) and the Tees Valley Combined Authority has been set up to drive the project forward.

This will be a once in a generation opportunity which could deliver a nationally significant zone bringing a host of benefits to the Borough and the whole of the Tees Valley. The zone will help to reduce health inequalities within the Tees Valley, with the site pioneering modern health provision to better meet residents' needs.

A new base for pizza peddling success story

After working a corporate office job for 15 years, James, founder of Flaming Dough and Crust, took the plunge to change his hobby into a business and has never looked back.

Flaming Dough is a mobile wood-fired pizza van stationed at regular spots in Billingham and Wynyard three nights a week as well as catering for events including weddings and corporate events.

"I started Flaming Dough as a hobby alongside my day job back in February 2022" James said. "It was all very quick: I mentioned the idea to my wife one evening, and then the next day I collected a 1960's horse trailer.

"Three months later it was converted into a mobile catering unit, and we started selling pizzas on an evening alongside my day job."

The success of Flaming Dough has allowed James to expand the business to a permanent location on Norton High Street: Crust.

"I love Norton village. I've grown up here and always loved the idea of opening a place in my community. It's a great place to live, the people are superb, and we've experienced huge support from the people of Stockton-on-Tees."

Drive to improve private rental standards takes a step forward

Under the proposals, all private landlords operating in Central Stockton, Newtown and Thornaby will be required to obtain a licence from the Council.

The licence will be valid for up to five years and is set to contain a series of conditions that the licence holder will be required to comply with. Some of the conditions include gas, electrical and fire safety, property and tenancy management and tackling anti-social behaviour.

This follows on from the findings of a detailed consultation, which ran from November 2023 until January 2024 and found that across the three areas, 62 per cent of all residents who responded were in favour of the proposals.

Selective Licensing is proposed in Central Stockton and North Thornaby on the basis this area is or is likely to become an area of low housing demand. In Newtown the area has been brought forward due to high levels of crime and antisocial behaviour, with all three areas having a high proportion of privately rented properties.'

The official start date for the Selective Licensing scheme will be confirmed this summer.





Meet your new Mayor of Stockton-on-Tees

Councillor John Gardner is the new Mayor of Stockton-on-Tees. He was officially installed in April, replacing Councillor Jim Beall at the end of his mayoral year.

Born in the Borough, Councillor Gardner lived in Fairfield and attended Fairfield Junior School and Grangefield Grammar School for Boys.
